The night I was born, my father ran over a coyote and killed it on the way to the hospital. This always made me sad.

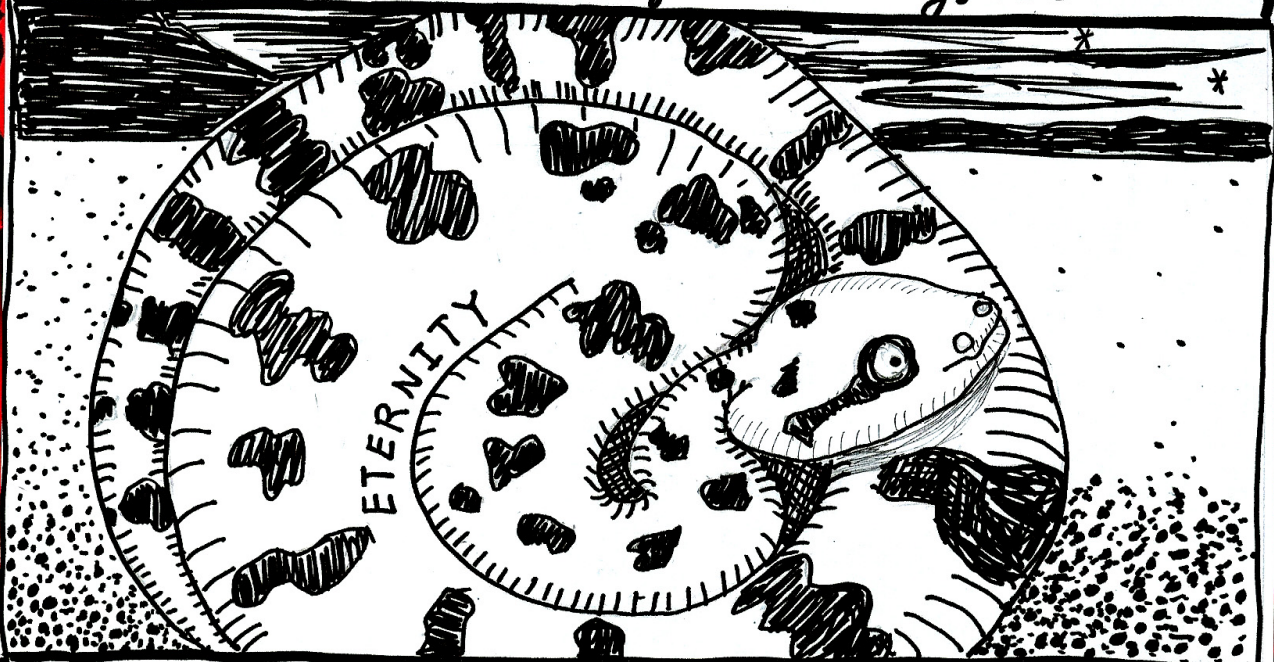





But it was also exciting—a life for a life! It was mysterious and I felt special. I asked to hear the story again and again.
